### Introduction

The primary objective of internal audit is to review, appraise and report upon the adequacy of internal control systems operating throughout the council. To achieve this SALC adopt a predominantly systems-based approach to audit.

The council's internal control system comprises the whole network of systems established within the council to provide reasonable assurance that the council's objectives will be achieved, with reference to:

- the effectiveness of operations
- the economic and efficient use of resources
- compliance with applicable policies, procedures, laws, and regulations
- the safeguarding of assets and interests from losses of all kinds, including those arising from fraud, irregularity, and corruption
- the integrity and reliability of information, accounts, and data

## Methodology

When conducting the audit, the internal auditor may:

- conduct a selective assessment of compliance with relevant procedures and controls expected to be in operation during the financial year in order to be able to complete the Annual Internal Audit Report 2022/23 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR)
- review the reliability and integrity of financial information and the means used to identify, measure, classify and report such information
- review the means of safeguarding assets and, as appropriate, verify the existence of such assets
- appraise the economy and efficiency with which resources are employed, identify opportunities to improve performance and recommend solutions to problems
- review the established systems to ensure compliance with those policies, procedures, laws, and regulations which could have a significant impact on operations, and determine whether the council complies
- review the operations and activities to ascertain whether results are consistent with objectives and whether they are being conducted as planned

| <i>Is the ledger maintained and up to date?</i>  | Yes | For the year under review, the council used excel spreadsheets to produce reports on a receipts and payments basis. The Responsible Financial Officer (RFO) has ensured that the cashbook is the focus for day-to-day accounting and is aware that the balancing off and reconciliation to the bank statement remains the most important control over the accounting system.  |
| <i>Is the ledger on the correct basis in relation to the gross income/expenditure?</i><br>(under Proper Practices, Councils are required to work on an Income & Expenditure basis when their gross income, or gross expenditure, exceeds £200,000 for 3 consecutive years)       | Yes | Council's gross income and expenditure level is below the threshold of £200,000 and has been for three (3) continuous years. Council's operating under this limit may choose either to report on an income and expenditure basis or on a receipts and payments (R&P) basis. Council has elected to report its financial matters on an income and expenditure basis with adjustments at year end.<br>At the meeting of 27 <sup>th</sup> April 2024, council agreed to the proposal from the RFO to restate the Annual Returns to bring the accounts in line with work done during the financial year and more precise Income & Expenditure end of year reporting. This work has been undertaken to ensure that the current year and the prior year are aligned and presented on the same basis.<br><i>Comment: council should note that where amendments are made to prior audited years, the word RESTATED should be written above the restated column.</i> |

Council follows Proper Practices in ensuring that its accounting procedure gives an accurate presentation of an authority's true financial position by focusing on the balance of economic benefits that it has under its control, rather than just its bank balance and the Responsible Financial Officer (RFO) has ensured that there are clear financial management reports submitted to the council on a regular basis.  |

| Have Standing Orders been adopted, up to date and reviewed annually?  | Yes | The Standing Orders, as seen on the Parish Council's website, were reviewed at the meeting of 23 <sup>rd</sup> January 2024. Council's Orders, are based on the latest model published by the National Association of Local Councils (2018) with adjustments to procurement thresholds as advised in 2022. The Standing Orders are compliant with legislation and have been adapted (where they are not statutory requirements) to ensure that they are relevant to the Parish Council. |
| Are Financial Regulations up to date and reviewed annually?   | Yes | Financial Regulations (FR), as seen on the Council's website were reviewed at the meeting of 123 <sup>rd</sup> January 2024 and are based on the NALC Model Financial Regulations 2019 with provisions included as outlined under LTN 87 - Procurement – March 2022.<br><i>Comment: council might wish to note that SALC have advised that new model financial regulations are available for councils to adopt at the earliest opportunity.</i>   |
| Has the Council properly tailored the Financial Regulations?  | Yes | The Council's Financial Regulations have been tailored to the Parish Council.   |
| Has the Council appointed a Responsible Financial Officer (RFO)? <sup>1</sup>   | Yes | In accordance with Section 151 of the Local Government Act 1972(d) (financial administration), the Council has appointed a person (the Clerk) to be responsible for the administration of the financial affairs of the relevant authority. Council's Financial Regulation 1.8 confirms that the Clerk is so appointed.  |

| Is there supporting paperwork for payments with appropriate authorisation?   | Yes | A selection of random payments were cross checked against payment schedules, cash book, bank statement and invoices and all were found to be recorded/ authorised in accordance with Proper Practices. A further spot check of items paid via the system from the Council's Accounts was also cross checked against cashbook, bank statements and invoices. All were found to be in order. A spot check of payments made under contractual terms were further analysed and all were found to be in accordance with agreed schedules and sums approved.   |
| Where applicable, are internet banking transactions properly recorded and approved?  | Yes | Internet banking is operated in accordance with the Council's own Financial Regulations and is used for the settlement of the Council's expenditure. The council's risk assessment documentation details the procedure to be followed for the making of such payments in accordance with council's own Financial Regulations.<br><i>Comment: to further demonstrate good practice, council's internal controls provide details of the verification process that will be undertaken by the council, with such reviews being evidenced in the minutes and any discrepancies identified and addressed. This is not only good practice but is also a safeguard for the RFO and fulfils one of the authority's internal control objectives.</i> |
| Is VAT correctly identified, recorded, and claimed within time limits?   | Yes | VAT is identified in the cash book with the year-end balance standing at £6,490.62, which was submitted as a reclaim on 30 <sup>th</sup> April 2024. The VAT reclaim for the period ending 31 <sup>st</sup> March 2023 in the sum of £4,638.55 was settled in May 2023.  |

Donations evidenced from the cashbook totalled £11,062.78.<br><i>Comment: council might wish to consider the adoption of a grant awarding policy that sets out the principles, criteria and processes that govern how all grants are made allowing the council to make an informed assessment of grant applications so that decisions are made in a way that is fair and transparent.</i> |

Core cover for the council's insurance policy is shown as: Employer's liability: £10million; Public/Products Liability: £10million; Trustees and Directors' Liability: £1million and Fidelity Guarantee of £250thousand.</p> <p><i>Comment: Council has followed recommended guidance by ensuring that its Fidelity Cover is equal to at least the sum of the year-end balances plus 50% of the precept/grants to be received in the following April/May and/or during the year upon receipt of grants.</i></p> <p>During the year under review, council is able to demonstrate, evidence from a review of the minutes, that it is aware that it is the responsibility of the Council as a whole to satisfy itself that insurances are adequate and that all steps have been taken to mitigate and manage identified risks with appropriate insurance and that annual reviews of the Council's insurance were undertaken prior to renewal. | <i>Verify that the precept amount has been agreed in full Council and clearly minuted</i> | Yes | The precept for the year 2023 – 2024 was set at £41,600 at the meeting of 24 <sup>th</sup> January 2023 with the minutes showing that council agreed to a 1.9% rise on a Band D Council Tax dwelling.<br>The precept for the year 2024 – 2025 was discussed and approved at the meeting of 23 <sup>rd</sup> January 2024 and set at £64,817. The minutes show that this would represent a 53% increase on a Band D Council Tax dwelling over that set for the previous year and the reasoning behind the increase. At the latter meeting council also agreed to the uplift in burial fees by 10%.  |
| <i>Regular reporting of expenditure and variances from budget</i>                         | Yes | As noted in the previous internal audits, Council considered its six-monthly report summarizing the Council's receipts and payments and aggregate receipts and payments for the year to date with balances held at the meeting on 26 <sup>th</sup> September 2023. The review also covered the budget for the current year and a review of income and expenditure against budget along with forecasts for the remainder of the year.<br><i>Comment: Council has been previously advised to consider this matter and ensure that, in accordance with its own standing orders, a quarterly statement summarizing the Council's receipts and payments and aggregate receipts and payments for the year to date with balances held is submitted and considered by the Council.</i><br><u>Point to note:</u> the clerk has stated that moving forward, council will be moving to quarterly budget monitoring following the move to the Scribe Accounting package. |
| <i>Reserves held – general and earmarked<sup>6</sup></i>                                  | Yes | The Council, as at year-end, had overall reserves totalling £86,539 (rounded) Earmarked Reserves totalling £26,114 and General Reserves of 60,425.<br><i>Comment: Council should note guidance as issued by Proper Practices which states that it is regarded as acceptable for a council's general (non-earmarked revenue) reserves to be equal to 3 to 12 months of Net Revenue Expenditure and should ensure that the level of general reserves held is in accordance with an adopted General Reserve Policy.</i>   |

The adopted policy shows that even at times of extreme financial pressure the Council will keep a minimum balance sufficient to pay one month's salaries to staff at all times. It is noted that the declared value for all assets at year-end (31.03.2024) is £62,345 which reflects additions during the year under review. |
